# **Course Description:**

This course will introduce students to Chicana contemporary issues while examining historical events that have shaped the current social, political, cultural, and economic experiences of women of Latin American origin in the United States, with particular emphasis on the experiences of Mexican-origin women. Particular attention to the topics of gender, sexuality, patriarchy, spirituality, indigeneity, and intersectionality will be analyzed through Chicana/Latina/Ethnic Studies frameworks. These topics will be explored through a critical engagement with theory, interdisciplinary readings, poetry, Chicana/Latina popular culture, and film.

### A Note about the Global Pandemic & Current Social & Political Movements:

The last four years have been full of unprecedented events, from CoViD-19 affecting the global population especially historically marginalized communities, parents/caregivers, and workers, to renewed protests against police brutality/racism through the #BlackLivesMatter movement and attacks on bodily autonomy. # **Course Requirements and Assignment Guideline:**

### **In Class Participation and Engagement** (10%)

Students are required to attend our weekly in person lectures on campus. Along with attendance, active engagement during class time such as asking questions, participating in group discussions, and small group assignments will be expected from students throughout the semester. These activities will help us further understand the subject matter we are learning about but also foster a learning community with each other. Please come prepared having completed the assigned readings to help facilitate our time together. If you cannot attend one of our sessions, please contact me via Canvas Inbox.

A Note for Academic Parents/Guardians: I welcome families in my classroom, if, for whatever reason you need to bring with you your child or the person you care for to our session together, my only request is that you let me know ahead of time that way I can prepare our class.

### Canvas Activities (20%)

Students will engage with class activities that will help nurture their questions, ideas, and perspectives around the weekly topics we will be discussing in class. Activities will be posted on Canvas and provide a framework to prepare students for their final project at the end of the semester.

### **Close-Reading Analysis** (25%)

Students will be asked to submit close-reading analysis papers to demonstrate how they are engaging with the course materials such as lectures, readings, podcasts, interviews etc. The goal of the assignment is to continue cultivating a student's academic writing while also encouraging them to explore their own ideas and thoughts regarding course topics and subject matter. Prompts and guides will be provided in our learning management system (Canvas).

### **Discussion Posts & Flip Videos** (25%)

To stimulate in class discussion and our own knowledge production, we will be posting our ideas, thoughts, and questions through Discussion Posts and Flip Videos. Prompts and due dates will be provided in the instructions on how to complete these assignments to earn full credit.

### Final Project (20%)

Our final project will be a culmination of the work we have accomplished throughout the semester. Students will have a variety of approaches to choose from on how to answer the final project's prompt. Students will use the scholarship and research studied in class to help produce their own contribution to the field of Chicana/Latina Studies. Final Project will be due on **Provide Date before 11:59 p.m.** (**P.S.T.**); students will submit their final project in Canvas.

### Dr. Ruiz's Late Policy:

Life happens to all of us, especially if we are juggling multiple hats like being employed, being a family member, children, school, personal life, etc. While I will place deadlines for all assignments in our course, I am more than happy to have a discussion with you if you need an extension on a deadline. Late work will not be penalized., but I ask that you respect our time together and try your best to meet our calendar due dates. To maintain my sanity when grading and keep everyone's grades up to date, I have two hard deadlines for late work:

### Dr. Ruiz's Missing Assignment Policy

You will notice that if you miss an assignment in my course, Canvas will automatically provide 50% of the total points in your grade book. For example, if an assignment is worth 20 points, and you miss the deadline, the Canvas grade book will automatically grant you 10 points (50%). Why might you ask? It is my pedagogical belief that our traditional grading system is inequitable. It takes more points, 69 points to be exact, to get closer to a passing "C" grade than it does to move between passing grades such as between or on the verge of an "B" grade to an

"A" grade. Therefore, to address this inequity, I have created a baseline for everyone, that way you're are not starting at zero, but at the midway point of the assignment, to encourage you to submit the assignment and earn a passing grade or better for it. If you have any questions or concerns about this policy, please make sure you reach out to me.

### **Active Participation in the course**
