1 COMPLETE THE ONLINE ADMISSION APPLICATION

Starting October 1, 2025

1a. Going to college is MAJOR... do you know yours? When completing the AHC admissions application, you will be asked to select a major. This is the area of study you will focus on that will lead to your future career. You want to be sure to select one aligned with your interests and career goals. If you need help deciding, take the short career quiz and/or browse our Areas of Interest on our website before you apply at hancockcollege.edu/pathways/quiz.php.

1b. Visit hancockcollege.edu/apply/ccapply.php to get started. Select summer 2026. Redo this process again for fall 2026.

To complete the application, you will need:

- ☐ A copy of your current high school transcript. Placement for math and English is based on your high school GPA.
- ☐ Your Social Security Number or permanent resident card. If you do not have either, leave this section of the application blank.
- ☐ Your chosen major at AHC. Visit our Areas of Interest web page at hancockcollege.edu/pathways/ for a list of our current associate degrees, transfer degrees, and certificates.
- ☐ An email address (please do not use your high school email address). If you or your parents do not have an email address, please sign up for one at yahoo.com or gmail.com before you get started.

Your AHC student ID (H#) and your username will be sent to the email address that you used to apply within 24-36 hours. Be sure to keep both of these in a safe place. Your AHC student ID (H#) will be used throughout your time at AHC.

4 ATTEND LAUNCH TO COLLEGE

Starting February 2026

Students can choose to follow path 4a OR 4b:

4a- Seniors attending Promise Registration Rally:

- ☐ Attend a Launch to College event at your high school to complete a first-semester plan.
- ☐ High school seniors who complete Promise Steps 1-4 by April 17 2026, will be invited to attend our Promise Registration Rally on April 30, 2026 happening at your school site to register for summer and/or fall classes the same day.

4b- Seniors completing registration on their own:

- ☐ Students unable to attend a Launch to College event and/or the Promise Registration Rally will need to complete the following steps to register for courses during priority registration:
- 1. Complete a first semester plan with an AHC counselor before **Friday, April 17, 2026**.

5 ATTEND PROMISE REGISTRATION RALLY

Starting April 30, 2026

Priority registration for Promise students is only available upon completion of steps 1-4.

For most students, Promise Registration Rallies will occur at your high school sites on the very first day of priority registration on Thursday, April 30, 2026. AHC representatives will be on-site to assist students in enrolling for their summer and/or fall 2026 courses.

Students who are eligible for priority registration and are completing registration on their own, can follow the steps below:

1. Go to hancockcollege.edu and log in to your myHancock portal
2. Scroll down to "Register Add/Drop Classes"

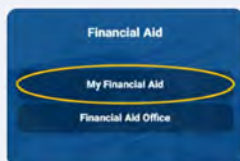
3. When you register, have your first semester education plan (SEP) available. If you need a copy, you can obtain one by logging into myHancock portal and clicking on "Degree Works".
4. You **MUST** register for a minimum of 12 units for fall 2026 AND spring 2027 semesters. There is NO minimum-unit requirement if you attend summer 2026.
5. You **MUST** register and complete one English and one math class during the summer, fall, or spring semester, if required by your program of study (major).

While we highly encourage students to attend the registration event, students who are unable to attend the Promise Registration Rally can visit the Admissions and Records website to review Steps to Enrollment: hancockcollege.edu/apply/register.php

CHECK YOUR FINANCIAL AID STATUS AFTER YOU REGISTER

- Go to hancockcollege.edu and log in to your **myHancock portal**
- Scroll to the "Financial Aid" button and click **"My Financial Aid"**
- Choose the Award Year: **"Summer 2026 to Spring 2027."** You will see your unsatisfied requirement/documents.



- If you have a Financial Aid Missing Documents, you will need to create an account before you can continue. Use your last name, as reported on your FAFSA when creating your account.
- Double click on each of the required items and complete each missing document listed. You may need to print, scan, and upload to submit these documents. If you are unable to upload, email the completed and signed documents to finaid@hancockcollege.edu.

You must complete and submit all of the required documents before you can be awarded any additional financial aid grants.

Students will receive a notification to their myHancock email about steps to complete. These steps, including any requested documents, must be completed before students can receive any financial aid funds. The priority deadline to complete your financial aid file for summer 2026 students is **May 22, 2026**. The priority deadline to complete your financial aid file for fall 2026 students is **July 24, 2026**. For questions, call the Financial Aid office at 805-922-6966 ext. 3200.

6 COMPLETE A COMPREHENSIVE STUDENT EDUCATION PLAN (SEP)

May - October 2026

- ☐ You will need to have this completed before registration begins for the spring 2027 semester, which is usually in early November. We strongly encourage students to complete all Hancock Promise steps no later than the start of fall 2026.

The priority timelines shown above have been developed to ensure that students have maximum access to priority registration services at AHC for summer & fall 2026. Completion of these steps after the priority timelines will still be accepted and processed on a first-come, first-serve basis through May 2027.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Enroll at AHC immediately after graduating from high school (includes public, charter, private or home schools) **OR** adult schools located within the AHJCC district.

- Complete the FAFSA or CADAA.
- Register and complete a minimum of 12 units in both fall and spring semesters. There is NO minimum unit requirement if you attend summer school.
- Maintain a 2.0 grade point average in the fall semester in order to be eligible for the Promise in the spring semester.
- Complete one English and one math class during the summer/fall 2026 or spring 2027 semesters at AHC, if required by the program of study.

Students should review these eligibility requirements carefully to ensure they are eligible for the second year of the Hancock Promise. - ☐ 1. Completed English 101 with a "C" grade or better*
- ☐ 2. Completed a 100 level 3-unit math course with a "C" grade or better*
- ☐ 3. Completed 24 or more units**
- ☐ 4. Must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.00 by the end of the spring 2027 semester.
- ☐ 5. Completed a Comprehensive Student Education Plan (CSEP)
- ☐ 6. Submitted a 2026-2027 FAFSA/CADAA

* Students who are enrolled in a certificate program that does NOT require math or English will be exempt from the Math and English Requirement. (The student must have a CSEP on file and be following the courses required for the certificate program to maintain exemption.)

** Students who complete math and English by the end of summer 2027 may appeal to the Dean of Student Services to have their Promise Year 2 award starting with the Fall semester.

Items 1 through 4 must be completed no later than the end of spring 2027. Students should complete their CSEP and their application for financial aid no later than July 31, 2027.

2 COMPLETE A COMPREHENSIVE STUDENT EDUCATION PLAN

Starting May 2026

- ☐ **Complete your Comprehensive Student Education Plan (CSEP) by July 31, 2027.**

A comprehensive SEP is a semester-by-semester plan created with an AHC counselor listing all the courses you will need to reach your educational goal.

3 COMPLETE THE ONLINE FAFSA OR DREAM ACT APPLICATION Starting October 2026

Complete a 2027-2028 financial aid application. Students must complete an application for financial aid every single year they are in school. To ensure that you are considered for the maximum state financial aid grants, you **MUST** apply for financial aid by **Tuesday, March 2, 2027**.

Attend a Cash for College event to receive assistance in completing either application.

4 REGISTER FOR SUMMER/FALL 2027 Starting early April 2027

1. Class search opens early April. Registration opens late April for summer and fall semesters.
CLASSES FILL QUICKLY SO REGISTER EARLY!
2. Check My Registration Date on myHancock under the "Registration" tab for your registration date.
3. When you register, refer to your comprehensive student education plan (CSEP) which can be found in Degree Works in your "Plans" tab.

Promise Reminders:

You must register for and complete at least 12 units each semester, both fall and spring. Although not required, we strongly recommend you register for summer courses as well. All summer and winter courses are covered by the Hancock Promise.

5 REVIEW YOUR ELIGIBILITY TO GRADUATE/TRANSFER Starting September 2027

- ☐ Students interested in applying to transfer should begin visiting the **University Transfer Center** in **EARLY FALL 2027** to ask about application timelines.
Each school and university has their own requirements depending on the major, so meeting with a counselor is necessary to ensure you have met all transfer requirements.
- ☐ Students intending to graduate in May 2028 should meet with a counselor in **EARLY FALL 2027** to ensure they are meeting all AHC graduation requirements.

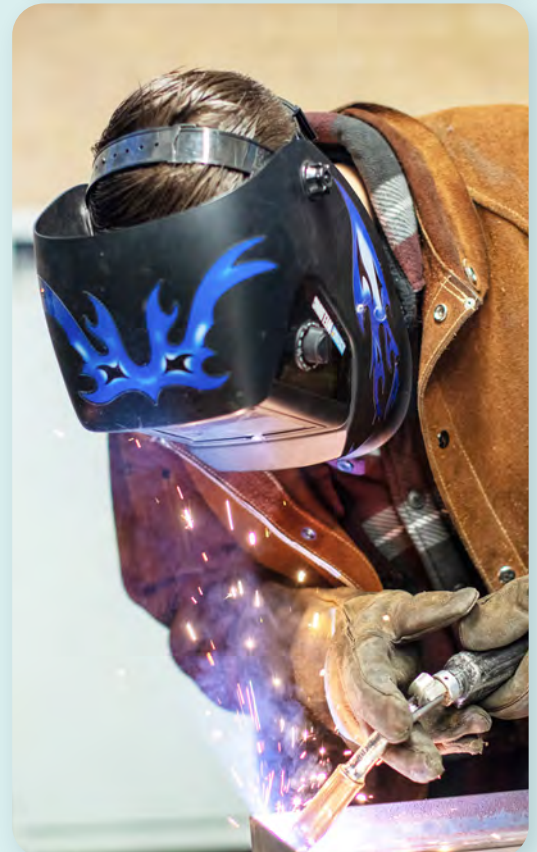

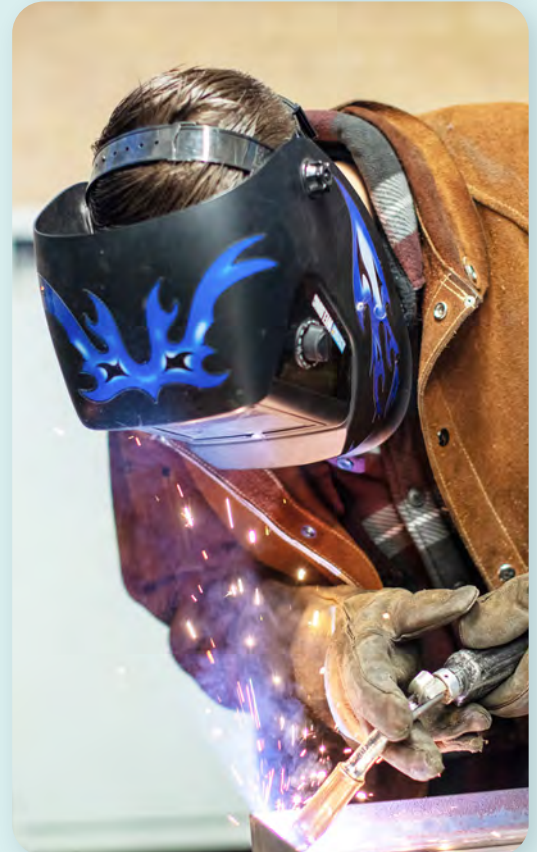

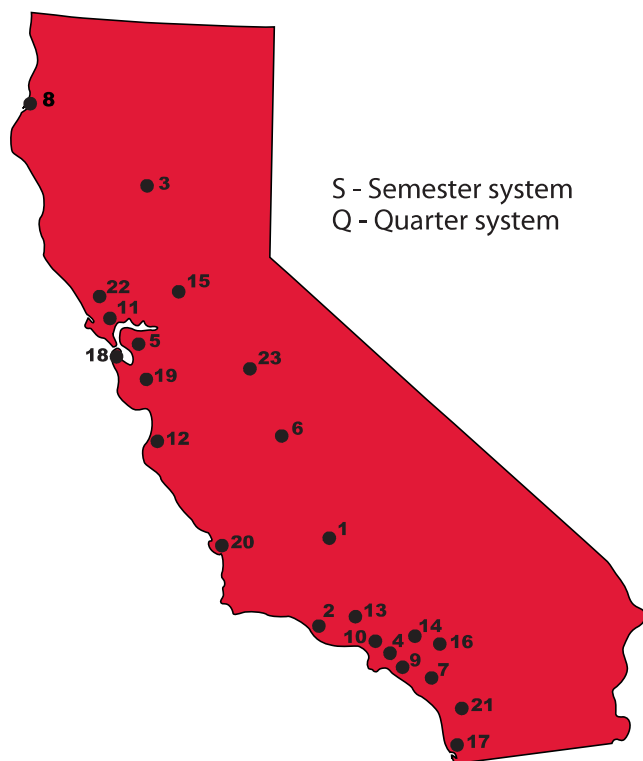

The University of California has nine undergraduate campuses. With the Transfer Success Pathway program, you can take the first steps toward earning your four-year degree while you're enrolled at a community college. If you're entering a California Community College for the first time, the Transfer Success Pathway program guarantees you admission to a CSU so you can keep moving ahead.

As a Transfer Success Pathway student, you'll have access to **personalized support** as you make the transition from community college to a CSU within three years. You can receive **pre-admission advising** to help select classes and receive invitations to **events at your chosen university**.

In short, you'll have access to more guidance and help to ensure all your hard work at your community college transfers to the CSU.

TAKE THE FIRST STEP

Find out if you're eligible for the Transfer Success Pathway program. Eligible students can enter into an agreement with one university of their choice. This agreement indicates that you intend to transfer from community college to this CSU within three years.

YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE IF:

- You're a recent high school graduate or you earned a GED and you haven't earned any college credit since completing high school.
- You're a first-time freshman entering a California Community College and were not eligible to attend the California State University when you graduated from high school.
- You're a first-time freshman who was eligible to attend the CSU, but you didn't do so because of personal or financial reasons.
- You were admitted to a CSU campus, but the campus wasn't your first choice.

YOUR TRANSFER SUCCESS PATHWAY

01 CREATE AN ACCOUNT ON THE CSU TRANSFER PLANNER.

The CSU Transfer Planner portal makes it easy to check your eligibility. You can also explore CSU campuses and degree programs, finalize your agreement with one of our 23 universities and track coursework at your community college. If you've applied to the CSU in the past through Cal State Apply, you have a CAS ID, which you can link to your CSU Transfer Planner account.

02 FIND YOUR RIGHT FIT.

Now you're ready to look for the place and the program that's best for you: Explore any or all of the CSU's 23 member universities (calstate.edu/find-your-csu) and more than 4,000 degree programs (calstate.edu/degrees) to find the right fit.

Once you've chosen a university and a major, be sure to review the degree program transfer requirements, too; you'll find these in the CSU Transfer Planner. For each program, you'll see requirements for overall grade point average (GPA) and for the GPA in your major (this is your "transferable GPA"), as well as the minimum grade required for prerequisite courses and any other requirements.

03 SIGN AN AGREEMENT WITH YOUR CHOSEN CSU.

Now you're ready to enroll in the Transfer Success Pathway program through the CSU Transfer Planner. Choose a start date and sign one agreement with the university you selected. As a Transfer Success Pathway student, you're guaranteed admission to your chosen university for a future term! (You can only have **one** agreement, though you are able to cancel the agreement through the CSU Transfer Planner if your plans change.)

04 ACCESS CSU SERVICES.

In addition to the services you receive from your community college, as a student in the Transfer Success Pathway program you can get support and answers to your questions—including pre-admission advising—through your CSU.

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College Terms You Should Know



Postsecondary Education in California

- **Postsecondary Education:** educational instruction offered beyond high school
- **California Private/Postsecondary Institutions:** 2,500 independent educational institutions and agencies that offer occupational instruction beyond high school
- **Higher Education:** postsecondary educational instruction offered at the collegiate level
- **The University of California (UC):** includes the following campuses: Berkley, Davis, Irvine, Los Angeles, Merced, Riverside, San Diego, San Francisco, Santa Barbara and Santa Cruz.
- **The California State University (CSU):** includes the following campuses: Bakersfield, Channel Islands, Chico, Dominguez Hills, Fresno, Fullerton, Hayward, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Maritime Academy, Monterey Bay, Northridge, Pomona, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Jose, San Luis Obispo, San Marcos, Sonoma and Stanislaus.
- **The California Community Colleges:** includes 112 two-year colleges and numerous branch campuses.
- **Independent California Colleges and Universities:** includes approximately 75 accredited independent colleges and universities affiliated with the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities (AICCU).

Types of Instruction

- **Semester System:** both the regular and early semester systems offer approximately 18 weeks of instruction in the fall and in the spring. Under the regular system, fall semester normally runs from early or mid-September to mid- or late January; spring semester runs from late January or early February to late May or early June. Under the early system, fall semester normally runs from late August or early September to mid-December; spring semester runs from mid- or late January to mid-May.
- **Quarter System:** approximately 10 weeks of instruction offered three times a year during the fall, winter and spring. Some colleges also offer a summer quarter. Fall quarter normally runs from late September or early October to mid-December; winter quarter from early January to mid- or late March; and spring quarter from late March or early April to mid- or late June.
- **Summer Session:** the period of instruction offered June through August
- **Extension:** instruction offered at various off-campus, community sites during the regular school year
- **Correspondence:** home study courses which may occasionally involve on-campus participation
- **Full Time/Part Time:** student status based the number of enrolled units; often used to determine fees and eligibility for services
- **Lower Division:** courses offered for freshman/sophomore level credit; also, students whose class level is freshman or sophomore
- **Upper Division:** courses offered for junior or senior class level credit; also, students whose level is junior or senior

- **Undergraduate:** courses offered for freshman through senior level credit; also, student who have not completed a bachelor's degree
- **Graduate:** courses offered beyond the bachelor's degree level; also, students who have received a bachelor's degree and who are enrolled in post-baccalaureate instruction

Degree/Program Terms

- **Accredited:** a college or program which has been certified as fulfilling certain standards by a national and/or regional professional association
- **Associate Degree:** an Associate in Arts or Science or Associate in Arts or Science for Transfer degree, awarded by a community college upon completion of a two-year program
- **Bachelor's (baccalaureate) Degree:** a Bachelor of Arts or Sciences or related degree awarded upon completion of a four-year program
- **Master's Degree:** A Master of Arts or Science, or related degree, awarded upon completion of one or two years of study beyond the bachelor degree level
- **Doctorate Degree:** a Ph.D. or related degree, awarded upon the completion of a prescribed program beyond the master degree level
- **Teaching Credential:** a basic multiple or single subject teaching certificate obtained upon completion of a bachelor's degree and prescribed professional education requirements in four or more years of college
- **Certificate:** awarded upon completion of a prescribed series of courses, usually at a community college, and normally completed in a year or less
- **Pre-professional:** undergraduate coursework either recommended or required for enrollment in professional schools
- **Professional Schools:** law, medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine, pharmacy and other health science schools which require or recommend specific undergraduate preparation
- **Liberal Arts:** programs/courses in the humanities, natural sciences and social sciences
- **Transfer Program:** a community college program which provides the first two years of preparation for the baccalaureate degree
- **Occupational/Vocational Programs:** postsecondary education programs leading directly to employment upon completion of two years or less coursework
- **Major:** a group of courses in a single academic discipline which leads to a degree
- **Minor:** a secondary field of study outside of the major field. Some degree programs require a minor
- **Concentration:** an option or special emphasis within a degree program
- **General Education/Breath Requirement:** a group of foundation courses in several disciplines required for graduation which all students are expected to meet regardless of a major field

Admission

- **Matriculation:** the process of initially enrolling in college through payment of fees and registration of classes; it may also include an orientation, assessment, counseling and advising component at the California Community Colleges
- **Eligibility:** high school grades, completion of specified subjects, test scores, autobiography, interview, awards, activities and other evidence of past or potential achievement which may be required to determine admission to an institution
- **Honors Points:** up to eight designated honors courses taken in the last two years of high school can receive additional points in grade point average calculations for admission to the UC and CSU (A=5 points, B=4, C=3, D or F=0).
- **Application Filing Periods:** the period during which applications may be submitted
- **Impacted Programs:** some majors at some colleges that receive more applications than program space available; impacted program applicants normally must apply during a specified time period and participate in a competitive selection process
- **Exceptions/Special Action Admission:** A limited number of students may be admitted to some colleges as exceptions to the regular admission requirements based on special circumstances.
- **Candidates Reply Date/Student Intention to Register:** The University of California and many independent colleges require admitted students to indicate their intention to enroll by submitting a statement and/or deposit by a specified date.
- **Resident/Non-Resident Status:** Student status based on place of legal residence. Non-residents (out-of state/foreign students) who attend public colleges must pay higher fees and often meet higher admission requirements than resident students. Does not apply to students who attend independent or private colleges.
- **Registration:** The time students select classes and pay fees.

Examination/Tests

- **Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) American College Test (ACT):** Most four-year colleges use one of these tests to determine admissions eligibility
- **Achievement Tests:** A series of subject matter tests administered by the College Board which are used by some colleges for admissions and/or course placement purposes
- **Advance Placement (AP):** Designated senior-level honors courses that provide college credit for students scoring at a certain level on a final examination
- **Placement Tests:** Tests administered by colleges to determine the entry-level placement of students in certain basic courses such as English, mathematics, foreign language and science
- **TOEFL:** The Test of English as a Foreign Language is used to evaluate the English proficiency of people whose native language is not English. The test in listening, reading comprehension and structure/written expression measures the ability to understand North American English.

Costs/Financial Aid

- **College Costs:** The cost of attending college includes tuition/registration fees, books/supplies, housing, transportation and personal expenses.
- **Tuition/Registration Fees:** may be based on such factors as the number of units and the cost of supplies, equipment, parking and related fees.
- **Financial Aid:** Money available from colleges and universities, the federal and/or state government and various community resources to help meet college expenses. Aid possibilities include grants, loans, scholarships and work study programs.
- **Financial Aid Application:** In California the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is used to apply for most forms of financial aid.
- **Financial Need:** the difference between projected college costs and the expected family contribution based on evaluation of the FAFSA and supporting documents
- **Cal Grants:** California Financial Aid program available to California college-bound students based on high school academic achievement or family financial need

Special Programs and Services

- **Cooperative Education Programs:** combine classroom and related work experience. Student's alternate college coursework and related work internship by term or concurrently enroll in college and serve an internship on a part-time basis.
- **Disabled Students Program and Services (DSPS):** programs provided for students with verified disabilities and whose functional limitations require specialized services (e.g. counseling, mobility assistance, readers, interpreters, note takers, tutoring and test-taking assistance)
- **Educational Opportunity Programs (EOP):** University of California and California State University programs which provide special admission and enrollment support services for students who normally do not meet regular admission requirements and are economically disadvantaged, but who demonstrate the potential to succeed with help. Emphasis is primarily on students who may not have been able to attend college because of cultural, economic or educational background. Similar programs are offered by many other colleges under different names.
- **Extended Opportunity Programs/Services (EOPS):** community college programs which provide both financial and learning-skills assistance to students who may not have been able to attend college because of cultural, economic or educational background
- **Honors Programs:** provide special courses for high academic achievers often within the framework of general education. Programs may feature workshops, seminars and small group discussion sessions.
- **Internship/Coops:** provide students with opportunities to obtain credit through a carefully monitored campus or community work experience related to educational objectives.
- **Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC):** a program which upon completion of four years of appropriate college coursework and training, leads to commission in the U.S. Army, Air Force or Navy
- **Residence Hall (Dormitories):** campus living facilities usually reserved for unmarried students
- **Study Abroad/International Study Programs:** provide a year or more of study at a cooperating college in a foreign country with credit counting toward graduation requirements.

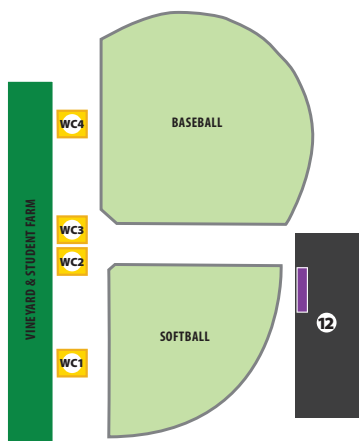

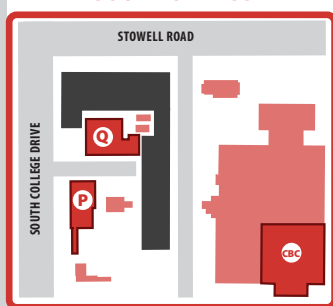
