The Effort to Bring a Bachelor's Degree to AHC





Allan Hancock College and Cuesta College have joined forces to embark on an ambitious campaign to reshape the Central Coast's educational landscape.

Our mission? To bridge the local workforce gap by offering four-year degrees under the California Community Colleges Baccalaureate Degree Program. These efforts are poised to change the game for students and the region's economic prospects.

The launch of the UnitED Central Coast campaign on October 5, 2023, brought together the leaders of both colleges and a diverse array of stakeholders, including students and representatives from the business, education, and nonprofit sectors. The message was clear: it's time for a brighter and more dynamic future.

Hancock aims to introduce a Bachelor of Science in applied professional studies that will support a variety of industries, including childcare, agriculture, professional service firms, and non-profit organizations such as the YMCA and Boys and Girls Club. Cuesta's proposal centers on a Bachelor of Science in education, targeting students seeking careers in teaching, education, and related roles.

During a joint information session, the colleges unveiled their strategic plans to introduce the four-year degree programs. The ripple effect on the vibrant economies of Northern Santa Barbara County and San Luis Obispo County promises to be transformative.

It's time for a brighter and more dynamic future.

The baccalaureate degrees will equip the Central Coast workforce with the skills needed to thrive in the region's flourishing industries.

The absence of affordable and accessible state universities on the Central Coast is a pressing issue. Local students must often choose between juggling family responsibilities or moving more than 100 miles from home to pursue a bachelor's degree. Expanding the capacity to provide fouryear degrees here at home is a policy priority at the local and state levels. The City of Santa Maria identified this as a top goal during its planning processes prior to the pandemic. REACH, the

region's primary economic development convener, included expanding access to baccalaureate degrees as a top goal in its Vision 2030 plan, noting that the lack of local access to bachelor's degrees is a "significant barrier for socio-economically disadvantaged communities." The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office identified equitable baccalaureate attainment in its Vision 2030 plan.

The community response has been tremendous. Dozens of letters of support were collected from Central Coast business owners, educators, and elected officials - all agreeing that the vision fits our community and the time to act is now.

What's next?

Both colleges plan to submit applications to the state in 2024; Hancock's submission is slated for January. The approval process may extend into late 2024. The college hopes to launch the baccalaureate degree in fall 2025.

Hancock Graduates Shine


Allan Hancock College's 102nd commencement ceremony was a resounding celebration of success as thousands of students embarked on their next adventure. The festivities took place on the college's athletics field at the Santa Maria campus on a sunny Friday, May 26, where more than 600 beaming graduates took center stage.

This year was nothing short of remarkable, with 1,236 students earning 1,971 associate degrees and 1,309 certificates of achievement spanning an impressive 101 different fields of study. Nearly 40 percent of the Class of 2023 earned a fee-free first year as a Bulldog with the Hancock Promise.

Additionally, Hancock's graduating class earned an estimated 1,040 degrees for transfer, making up more than 50 percent of all awarded degrees. In addition, the college maintained its streak of having the highest acceptance rate to Cal Poly, SLO, in 2023. Sixty-one percent of Hancock applicants were accepted to become Mustangs.













For vintner Fidencio Flores, the art and business of winemaking is literally in his blood.

Flores, of Santa Ynez, is a third-generation winemaker and the owner and operator of Esfuerzo Wines. Fidencio's greatgrandfather, Salvador Zepeda, was the first to cultivate grapes for the Firestone family in 1974. His son and Fidencio's grandfather, Armando Zepeda, planted the first vines in Buttonwood Vineyards in 1983.

"I grew up immersed in wine growing and the wine business," said Flores. "It really grew on me, and I knew that's what I wanted to do."

Flores' success in winemaking wasn't just due to his family's long history and deep knowledge of the industry. He also honed his talent and skills in Allan Hancock College's viticulture and enology program. Flores took Hancock classes during his summertime breaks from Chico State University.

"I wanted to keep learning and keep my knowledge sharp, so I came to Hancock's winemaking program," Flores said. "I was amazed at the quality of the program and education I was getting. All of my instructors had real experience or were actively working in the industry, and they were happy to share what they knew with us. That was very valuable."

Hancock's viticulture and enology program is one of the college's more unique offerings. The program educates students in the art and science of winemaking, covering grape cultivation, wine production, and the business and marketing aspects of selling wine. The program offers various degrees and certificates to prepare students for careers in the wine industry, professional advancement, or university transfer.

The program also offers students a hands-on learning experience. Students work in the college's on-campus vineyard and bonded winery to cultivate and

produce annual vintages. The wines are sold through the college winery and have earned national acclaim.

Flores graduated from Hancock's viticulture and enology program in 2012, but he is paying it forward by supporting the next generation of California winemakers at Hancock. Currently, he's sponsoring a recent graduate from the program as they continue their education at Fresno State University. Once they graduate, Flores said he plans to have a job waiting for them.

"Winemaking and farming are the lifeblood of our community, and you need to be willing to pass down what you know to the future generations," Flores said. "If you are not doing that, then the industry we've built in this community cannot thrive."

The Lompoc Valley Center Turns 25!



In 1999, the Allan Hancock College Lompoc Valley Center ushered in a new era of education when 1.643 students graced its campus. What was first a modest college presence in the Lompoc Valley had evolved into a thriving educational institution. Prior to this, students in Lompoc faced the challenge of attending classes in a cramped strip mall storefront or in repurposed elementary school buildings. However, with the construction of the Lompoc Valley Center, these students embarked on their academic journey among 22 brand new state-of-the-art classrooms and labs.

The Lompoc Valley Center quickly became a beacon of learning. Its dynamic growth reflected the aspirations of the community, offering a diverse range of degrees and certificates, from accounting to social science. In 2014, the LVC expanded its offerings via completion of the Public Safety Training Complex. The complex offers cutting-edge training

facilities, including a 37,000-squarefoot main building for fire and police academies, a burn house, a six-story fire tower, and specialized training areas. Since its inception, the Public Safety Training Complex has become the regional hub for emergency personnel training, facilitating effective collaboration among public safety agencies in times of crisis.

Allan Hancock College proudly introduced its latest addition in February 2023 – the brand-new Fine Arts Complex. This \$50 million, state-of-the-art facility serves as the centralized hub for the college's fine arts and performing arts programs, streamlining their operations and enhancing the campus experience.

The facility encompasses classroom and office spaces catering to the college's visual arts, multimedia and applied design, photography, film and video, dance, and music programs. Furthermore, it features the 350-seat Boyd Concert Hall, rehearsal spaces for dance and music, studios for art and pottery, student lounge areas, and a room for film screenings. Following its

groundbreaking in September 2020, the building welcomed students and faculty for the 2023 spring semester.

"This was definitely worth the wait and far beyond what we could have anticipated," said Hancock Professor of Art and Design and Fine Arts Department Chair John Hood. "The facility is truly stunning and a dream come true."

The college's commitment to sustainability was evident in the building's design. The facility features waterefficient plumbing fixtures, LED lighting throughout, and occupancy-controlled outlets and lighting to reduce energy consumption. Solar power plays a vital role, with solar panels on the terrace contributing to the building's energy,

passive solar metal panels aimed at reducing heating costs, and rooftop solar panels that supply hot water stored in insulated tanks on the second floor.

Funding for the Fine Arts Complex was sourced from the voter-approved Bond Measure I, the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office, and a generous donation from the estate of former Hancock fine arts faculty member Patricia Boyd.




Allan Hancock College and the Pacific Conservatory Theatre (PCPA) celebrated the opening of the new PCPA Stagecraft building on September 15. Located at the northwest corner of the Santa Maria campus, the 6,676-square-foot building serves as a cutting-edge facility for students and staff in PCPA's technical theatre training program, enabling the creation of professional-quality scenery, props, and costumes.

The new facility includes dedicated workspaces for carpentry, costume design, and set and prop construction. To ensure safety and cleanliness, the building is equipped with specialized technology, including an intricate dust control vacuum system, an outdoor welding yard, dye stations, and a laundry area.

"The modernity, effectiveness, safety, and efficiency of these stagecraft spaces will not only have a powerfully positive impact on the program's students and the scenery, properties, and costume departments, but on every member of the PCPA company and the thousands of Central Coast community members that we serve from our stages," said PCPA Artistic Director and Hancock Associate Dean Mark Booher.

The construction, initiated in August 2022, cost \$6.9 million and was paid for by the voter-approved Bond Measure I. The grand opening of the stagecraft building occurred as PCPA celebrated its 60th anniversary.

Student Arts Club Keeps Community Vibrant With Mall Murals

Hancock students are enthusiastic about making a positive impact on their community, and the members of the college's Studio Arts Club are shining examples of this commitment.

The club's hard work and talent are on full display at the Town Center Mall in Santa Maria, where the students painted two colorful, large-scale wall murals in 2023.

"We wanted to give back to our community and show them that art is alive and well in Santa Maria," said Hancock student and Studio Arts Club President Diana Barbosa. "We have so many talented artists at the college and in our city, and these murals are a way to remind people of that."

A total of 16 students worked on the two murals. The first mural, *Marisol*, is a 12x13-foot mural featuring a woman's face and underwater scenery. The club's second mural, *Quetzalcoatl*, features a massive depiction of the Aztec deity. Spanning 12x27 feet, this piece was created as a tribute to Santa Maria's Latinx community.

"They really thought about what the community would want to see in that specific space," said Hancock Associate Art Professor and club advisor Adrienne Allebe. "These students really put their heart and soul into these murals purely for the love of making art."

The students designed and painted the murals, which took roughly 52 to 78 hours to complete. The students put in those long hours of hard work on the projects before, after, and in between classes, some of them staying into the early morning to ensure the works of art came out exactly as they had envisioned them.

"Creating something that you know people are going to walk by and see every day is exciting and humbling," said club member and Hancock art student Esteban Guerra Pineda. "We worked very hard, and I hope people who walk by these in the mall will enjoy them."

The students in the Studio Arts Club show no sign of slowing down. They have participated in a number of community events, including the Santa Barbara Chalk Festival, Santa Maria Downtown Fridays, and Open Streets Santa Maria. In addition, they are also working on a mural for the Maya Restaurant.

"This really feels like a special time in the art program because we have so many talented, highly self-motivated students who sincerely enjoy each other and making art together," Allebe said. "It's been a joy to see the club grow and work so well together on these projects."



Allan Hancock College students come from all walks of life.

A strong and active commitment to fostering diversity, equity, and inclusion throughout Hancock's programs, services, events, and student clubs remains part of the college's core mission.

"Our efforts are focused on engaging the campus community to examine a diverse range of perspectives, cultivating skills, and providing support and resources to transform the way we serve students, employees, and the surrounding communities through culturally responsive and humanizing actions," said Hancock Superintendent/President Kevin G. Walthers, Ph.D.

In 2023, that mission was on full display as the college marked several important milestones. In June, Hancock partnered with students in the AHC Pride Alliance Club to host the college's first-ever pride flag celebration. The event, held in honor of Pride Month, was an opportunity for LGBTQIA students to make their voices heard and promote understanding and visibility for LGBTQIA issues.

"To all of the students who aren't out for whatever their reasons, I hope that they can see the flag and know that there's a community waiting here for them," said Pride Alliance President and Hancock student Matthew Denison, "We want them to know that the door is open to them whenever they're ready."

Hancock also continued its work supporting formerly incarcerated students and those impacted by the criminal justice system through the Phoenix Scholars program, Rising Scholars program, and the Beyond Incarceration Greater Education (BIGE) club.

Phoenix Scholars at Allan Hancock College is a program within Hancock's Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) that supports criminal justice system-impacted and gangimpacted youth seeking a higher education. The Rising Scholars program works directly with the United States Penitentiary in Lompoc and the Central Coast community to expand opportunities and build strong pathways from incarceration to educational achievement. The BIGE Club is a student-led organization dedicated to breaking down stereotypes about formerly incarcerated students and connecting them with support and resources during their journey at Hancock. The club is active and heavily involved on campus and in the community.

"We want to provide a warm and welcoming environment on campus," said BIGE Club Vice-President and Rising Scholar Program Specialist Gabriel Ochoa. "It's very helpful to see people who are familiar with the challenges of being a formerly incarcerated student supporting each other. It shows them they belong on campus."

While BIGE continues its important work, another student club is focusing on raising awareness about mental health issues.

Hancock's new Mental Wellness Club provides a safe space for students to share their experiences and feelings without fear of judgment, advocates for equal and easy access to mental health

resources, and works towards diminishing the stigma surrounding mental health and mental illness. In 2023, the club organized

training, events, and discussion panels designed to encourage students, staff, and faculty to learn more about mental health issues and how to support individuals experiencing mental health crises.

"Mental health is just as important as physical health, and it goes hand-inhand to be a well-rounded person," said Club President Samantha Martinez. "We wanted to create a space where people can have conversations about mental health without judgment or stigma. The reaction has been very positive."

These are just a few examples of how Hancock is building a more diverse and inclusive college experience in our community.

Deep in the heart of the AHC Public
Safety Training Complex, the college's
new EMS Paramedic Academy is training
the next generation of real-world heroes.
With the increasing demand for skilled
paramedics across the nation, the
program intends to meet a critical need in
our community.

The EMS paramedic program equips students with essential knowledge in areas like patient care, medication administration, and effective communication. Students become skilled in airway management and maintaining patient stability, preparing them to handle a wide variety of emergencies with skill and confidence.

"We prepare students first with lectures and then move them out to practice in a scenario setting," said program coordinator Sabrina Hrabe. "This way, they can feel comfortable and confident when applying hands-on skills in training and in the real world."

The inaugural class is already making a mark in paramedic education. The academy has earned approval from both the California State EMS Authority and the Santa Barbara County EMS Agency, a testament to the program's commitment to training future paramedics to the highest standards.

This is welcome news in an industry where paramedics are in high demand.







"There's a nationwide shortage of paramedics, so a lot of local partners and agencies are actively seeking these professionals," said Hrabe. "Out of 12 students in the program, almost half are currently employed with local agencies like the San Luis Obispo City Fire Department and the Santa Barbara County Fire Department."

The field offers diverse career opportunities beyond traditional ambulance roles,



including positions as flight medics and in the military, Hrabe added.

Prospective paramedic students begin their journey through Hancock's Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Academy. They must earn at least 1,000 hours of EMT experience within the past three years and maintain valid California EMT certification and CPR cards.

Upon completion of the paramedic program, graduates earn a certificate



of achievement, which qualifies them to take the National Registry **Emergency Medical Technician (NREMT)** examination, a critical step toward becoming licensed paramedics in the state of California.

"When I first started at Hancock my primary goal was to finish my degree after years of starting and stopping community college," said Goldstein. "I had no idea my experience at this school would be so transformative and expansive. It led me to where I am now."

Boyd was one of three individuals honored at Hancock Honors. The event recognized exceptional community leaders with ties



to Allan Hancock College who have made positive and lasting impacts through their lives and their work. Also honored were AHC Superintendent/President Emeritus Ann Foxworthy Lewellen, Ph.D. and GRAMMY Award-winning recording artist and PCPA alumnus Tommy Soulati Shepherd.

"Patty inspired generations of students, and her love and support of music and the arts in this community lives on through her legacy and in this concert hall," said Hancock Superintendent/President Kevin G. Walthers, Ph.D. "This facility would not be here without her generosity."



Proceeds from the Hancock Honors benefit the Hancock Promise program, which provides local high school graduates with a year of free tuition at Hancock.

"We are thankful to see individuals, businesses, and organizations in our community stepping up to support the Promise," said AHC Foundation Executive Director Jon Hooten, Ph.D. "Thanks to their support, we are closer to our goal of expanding the Hancock Promise to cover two full years of tuition for local students."

In 2022-23, the Allan Hancock College Bulldogs celebrated a year that stands as a milestone in our program's history. We witnessed an unprecedented level of success, both on and off the field, that exceeded all expectations.

Our programs tallied an impressive 115 wins, with 12 teams securing playoff berths. Notably, three of our coaches received the esteemed 'Coach of the Year' accolade from their league peers, while one of our student-athletes earned recognition as the men's swimming athlete of the year at the conference level.

Football claimed their 10th league champion title and the 2022 James
A. Cobb Family Strawberry Bowl championship. Our women's soccer team etched their name in history with their first conference championship win, and an impressive seven teams ranked within the top three in the final conference standings. Meanwhile, the women's basketball team achieved a 20+ win season, a milestone not reached since 1995. Additionally, our women's golf team, rejuvenated after a three-decade hiatus, qualified four individuals for the Southern California Regional Championship.

One of our most significant achievements was the graduation of 110 student-athletes

last spring. Over 80 percent of these graduates chose to further their education at four-year institutions, with nearly 40 of them signing scholarships to continue competing at NCAA and NAIA levels. Our men's and women's swimming programs also shone, earning six individual Western State Conference Champion titles and witnessing ten athletes secure top-10 finishes at the 3C2A State Championship.

While victories on the field are undoubtedly enjoyable, our primary focus extends beyond the win column. We prioritize the unique challenges faced by community college student-athletes and aim to guide them toward success in life.



We believe in preparing them with the skills they need to thrive. This mission requires a collective effort, and we are grateful for the collaboration and support from our dedicated team, including coaches, athletic trainers, academic counselors, sports information staff, and more.

Our work is demanding but fulfilling, as we strive to ensure that our studentathletes have a rewarding experience at Hancock, even without athletic scholarships or on-campus housing. We envision every athlete leaving as a proud Bulldog alum. We owe our gratitude to all who contribute to this shared vision.




