NEW PRESIDENT QUICKLY PICKS UP SPEED

With less than a month on the job, new Superintendent/President José Ortiz, Ed.D., has filled his days with learning the lay of the land. A media introduction and staff reception his first week gave way to a whirlwind of campus and community meetings, orientations, and more meetings to learn the culture and the customs of Allan Hancock College, its students, and its communities. "I know I have much to learn and many, many more people to meet," Ortiz said. "My goal is to work collaboratively as we address the mutual goals of the college and the community. I am so pleased to be here and look forward to long and rewarding relationships."

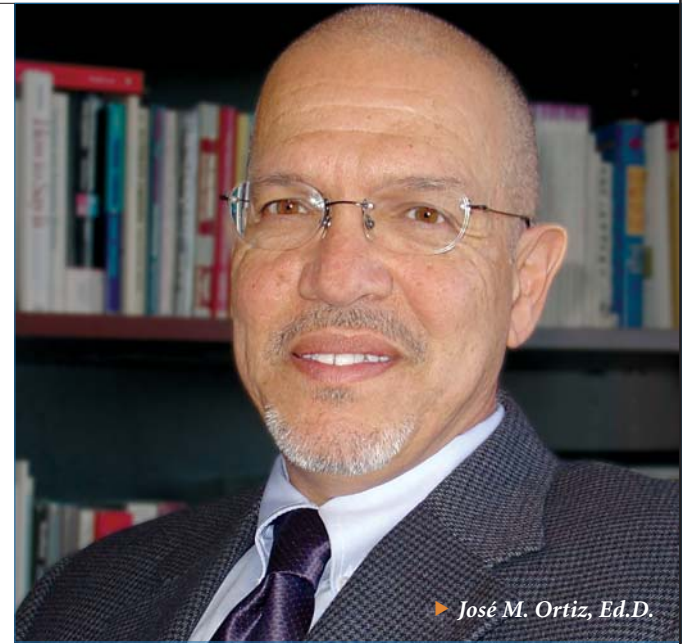
The Allan Hancock College Board of Trustees unanimously selected Ortiz as the new superintendent/president to succeed retiring Ann Foxworthy. He began July 5.

Ortiz was one of more than 40 candidates nation-

wide who vied for the top Hancock position.

He had been the chief instructional officer at Laney College since 2002. Before that he held the positions of associate vice president for academic affairs, workforce and community development; associate dean of instruction, extended campus and evening administration; and English instructor at Solano College in Suisun, California, between 1991 and 1999. Other college experience includes working as director of new program development and before that as an English instructor at Anne Arundel Community College in Arnold, Maryland; and as assistant director, business and executive management programs at the University of Maryland.

Ortiz holds a doctorate in education from the University of Maryland in education policy, planning and administration, specializing in higher and continuing education administration. He earned a

master's degree in teaching English as a second language from West Chester State University in Pennsylvania, and he holds a bachelor's degree in English from Catholic University of Puerto Rico.

Born and raised in New York City, Ortiz is bilingual in English and Spanish. He and his wife Carmen have two adult daughters, Loaiza of New York and Yria of Sacramento.

Building a future

The first of three major construction projects on the Santa Maria campus is well under way. These projects mark the largest campus building campaign on the Santa Maria campus since the 1960s. Several additional projects will follow pending future bond approval.

The \$9.1 million remodel and expansion of the Library/Media Technology Center will see the renovation portion of the project completed and opened as early as fall 2005. This area houses the traditional

library resources including the book stacks and circulation areas. The building addition, a two-story facility that will offer open access computer labs and the distance learning classrooms, among other features, is projected for completion in spring 2006.

The \$4.4 million Skills Center will replace two outdated and nonfunctioning buildings with a new space that will house desperately needed classrooms and meeting spaces. Construction on the Skills

Center is scheduled to begin in fall 2005. Both the Skills Center and the Library/Media Technology Center were made possible by funding from Proposition 47, passed by the electorate in 2002.

Bids for a third building, an advanced Science/Health Occupations Complex, will be sought this month, with construction on the \$13.2 million structure to begin as early as winter 2005. This space will contain new, modern science labs and classrooms that

will help alleviate the acute demand for more lab classes for students in health occupations and other programs. This construction was made possible by passage of Proposition 55.

In addition, should new bond funds become available, the college is poised to move forward on several other needed facilities expansions including a one-stop student services building, and a new fine arts complex, among others.

AHC students tops in transfer

It's déjà vu all over again. This fall, as in the last seven out of eight years, Allan Hancock College students are enjoying higher transfer acceptance rates to Cal Poly than students from neighboring community colleges. Of the Hancock students who applied to Cal Poly for the fall 2005 term, 76 percent were accepted. At Cuesta College, the Cal Poly transfer acceptance rate was 61 percent; and at Santa Barbara City College, the transfer acceptance rate to Cal Poly, as reported by the university, was 39 percent. Overall, the percent of total Cal Poly transfer applications accommodated for fall 2005 was 43 percent.

Allan Hancock College students had

similar transfer success to UCSB, where in the last nine years, Hancock students have consistently attained better transfer acceptance rates than the combined average of all other community colleges in the state. In fall 2005, 70 percent of the Hancock students who applied were accepted to UCSB. At Cuesta, that acceptance rate was 54 percent and at SBCC, 58 percent of students who applied were accepted at UCSB.

The transfer acceptance rate is determined by comparing the number of students accepted versus the number who applied.

"These transfer rates are gratifying and speak well of the level of preparation our students have as they ready

themselves for transfer to Cal Poly or UCSB," said Christine Reed, Allan Hancock College University Transfer Center coordinator/counselor. "We stay very focused on the exact requirements of the universities, and make sure our students are taking the right courses, in the right sequence." Reed added that a series of one-on-one counselor meetings, as well as workshops, help students prepare

for transfer, whether it be to Cal Poly, UCSB, UC Berkeley, Fresno State or any other university destination. "Our sole purpose in the transfer center is to ensure our students' transfer success. We take it seriously, and so do our students. They work very hard at being successful."

To help students make the transition to four-year universities, Allan Hancock College has forged a number of transfer guarantees to various institutions. For example, students who successfully complete the required curriculum at Hancock are guaranteed admission at nine California universities including UCSB, CSU Monterey Bay, UC Davis, CSU Northridge and more. Additional universities offer guaranteed spots for honors students and others consistently accept all AHC students who have completed the appropriate course of study.

Five local aerospace technicians who recently became the Central Coast's first core-certified aerospace technicians were honored recently at Allan Hancock College. They are among the first 50 nationwide who have attained certification as aerospace technicians through SpaceTEC, a consortium of 12 community college and university partners located in eight states, including Hancock, which has developed an approved national aerospace technician certification program. Among the other partners in the consortium are Brevard Community College at the Kennedy Space Center, Embry Riddle Aeronautical University, and the Com-

munity College of the Air Force. To attain certification status, candidates passed all three components of the National Science Foundation SpaceTEC core certification examination—written, oral and practical.

SpaceTEC certificates were presented to Denis Kellermann, Jay Patton, and Dan Romeyn of Lockheed Martin Technical Operations, and to MSgt Stephen Hrkach and TSgt Dean Krambeck of the 532nd Training Squadron, 30th Space Wing at Vandenberg AFB.

New computer science classes offered this fall

Computer science courses at Allan Hancock College are coming back in full force beginning this fall. A new full-time faculty member has been hired to renew and revamp the program that has had limited offerings in the past few years.

Michael Steinore is a computer science instructor who previously worked in industry as a software engineer, engineer and software manager at several high-tech companies including TRW, Hughes, Lockheed and Teknowledge. His professional experience

focused on building and managing commercial and military software applications in the areas of computer graphics, data analysis, artificial intelligence, statistical process control and factory automation. He was selected from applicants across the country to head up the college's computer science program.

"I'm very much looking forward to living in the Santa Maria area and joining the Allan Hancock College family. I hope to create innovative and interesting computer science curricula, as well as investigate opportunities for multi-disciplinary courses with my colleagues," said Steinore, who also plans to connect with the business community and Vandenberg Air Force Base to find out what the needs are.

Steinore has a B.S. in math and computer science from UC Davis and an M.S. in computer science from the University of Southern California. He also completed postgraduate work in computer science from the University of Santa Clara.

He will introduce and teach two new computer science courses this fall on the Santa Maria campus beginning August 23. They are:

- ▶ **COM SC 179 – Machine Learning**
(Tues/Thurs, 6:30-7:50 p.m.)
- ▶ **COM SC 179 – Perl/CGI Programming**
(Tues/Thurs, 5-6:20 p.m.)

Machine Learning will cover three sub fields of artificial intelligence: expert systems, neural networks, and one of the latest technologies, data mining. This is a course rarely offered at community colleges, according to Steinore.

The Perl/CGI programming class will cover the Perl programming language in-depth, from basic data types and regular expressions, to advanced topics such as object-oriented Perl and CGI programming. The course is designed to be taught in a UNIX environment.

In addition, Steinore will offer two existing courses:

- ▶ **COM SC 175/375 – Object-Oriented Programming**
(Tues/Thurs, 1-2:20 p.m.)
- ▶ **COM SC 102 – Introduction to Computing.**
(Mon/Wed, 6:30-8:20 p.m.)

For spring 2006, Steinore is planning to offer a course on Linux and UNIX shells scripting.

\$260,000 in scholarships awarded

Awards ranging in amounts up to \$10,000 were presented to students from all parts of the Central Coast, from the Santa Ynez Valley to the Five Cities area, at the college's 36th annual scholarship ceremony. In all, the Allan Hancock College Foundation awarded 279 scholarships totaling more than \$260,000 to 180 students this year. Nearly 650 students, relatives, friends, donors and community members attended the event.

A total of 130 donors from the community awarded scholarships to both returning and transferring students through the Allan Hancock College Foundation scholarship program.

The recipient of this year's prestigious \$5,000 Marian Hancock Scholarship was Kimberly Kaufman, right. The scholarship is named for Marian Hancock, the wife of Capt. G. Allan Hancock, for whom the college is named. Kaufman, a single mother, will transfer to UCSB in the fall to study chemical engineering.

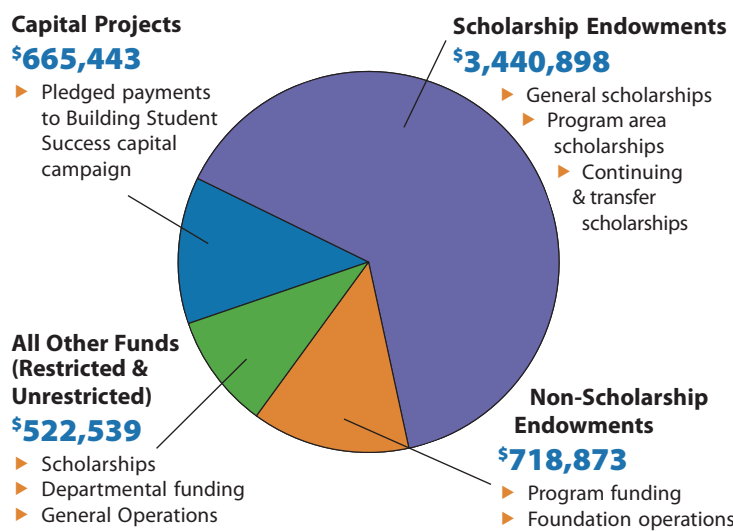

Highlights of 2004-2005

- Received total contributions of \$839,829 in 2004.
- Honored 150 donors and guests in October 2004 at the annual "Evening of Celebration," hosted by the foundation board of directors and held on the Santa Maria campus.
- Created 31 new scholarships for a total of \$28,500.
- Developed a new, three-year strategic plan for the foundation which the board of directors will use to establish its annual fundraising and development goals.
- Received a gift of \$34,000 designated for foundation general operations, to supplement instructional departmental budgets, and to purchase computers for new faculty at the college.
- Held the third annual golf tournament and Bulldog \$1,000,000 "Hole-in-One" ShootOut for a sold-out group of 120 golfers. Net proceeds from the golf tournament topped \$23,000.
- Five new scholarship endowments were set up during the year. Four were created through a single gift by donors, with the fifth endowment starting as an annual pledge to fund \$5,000 in scholarship awards and a promise by the donor to provide a \$200,000 gift through an estate plan. When fully realized, these endowments are projected to generate more than \$12,000 in annual scholarship funding for Allan Hancock College students.
- Received \$78,000 in grant funding from private foundations to provide needed resources and support for various college programs.
- Gifts totaling more than \$56,000 were added to existing scholarship endowments during the year. As these endowments continue to grow, so does the legacy of the donor as those gifts add to the total scholarships being awarded to Allan Hancock College students.

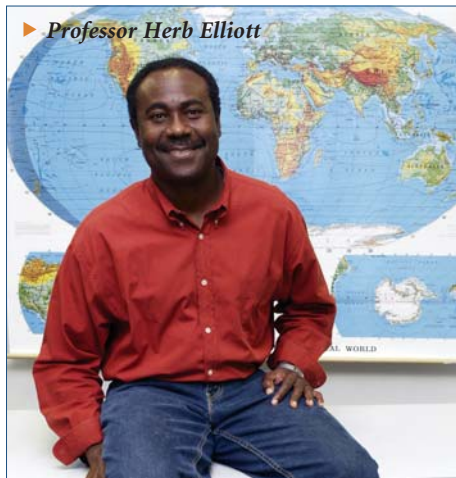
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New course goes global in teaching international trade



It seems only fitting that a new course offered by the college about the global economy and international trade would be offered globally—that is—via the Internet. Global Economics (ECON 141 or BUS 141) will be offered online this fall as a practical approach to understanding international trade.

“As an economist, I felt it was important that Californians understand, participate in, and influence the emerging global economy that is literally reshaping our world,” said professor Herb Elliott, the course creator. Elliott pointed out that as home to the world’s most sophisticated high technology

industries, California ranks as the world’s eighth largest economy. In fact, he said California’s international trade and investment directly and indirectly support 2.4 million, or one in every seven jobs in the state.

“Ultimately, the extent to which Californians achieve global literacy will determine the economic health of this state and quality of life for its people. We believe that a successful experience in this course will increase the participant’s understanding of international trade and the importance of diversity within it.”

Those who enroll in the three-unit course will cover such topics as outsourcing of American jobs, why nations trade, myths and realities of globalization, trade deficits and the economy, relocation of production to low-wage countries, and much more. “This is a great class for those currently employed or seeking opportunities in global trade. And frankly,” he said, “in these times, that means almost everyone.”

The class begins the week of August 22.

The human condition communicated through stories written by people from around the world is showcased in the 5th annual issue of Allan Hancock College’s *Mindprints, A Literary Journal*.

A collection of very short stories, memoirs, poetry and art by writers and artists from the United States and abroad, Volume V of *Mindprints* is available through the Learning Assistance Program (LAP) in Building I on the Santa Maria campus; at the Lompoc Valley Center, Building 2, Room 116; and at the Allan Hancock College Bookstore. “The journal is on the cutting edge of contemporary fiction, one of just a few produced at community colleges and other venues which showcases works by writers and artists with disabilities,” said Paul Fahey, a learning disabilities specialist at the college and the LAP-sponsored journal’s editor-in-chief.

“Two years in a row, *Writer’s Digest* magazine selected *Mindprints* as one of its top 30 short story markets,” he said. “Hopefully, this means we are succeeding in our mission to publish new and emerging artists and writers with disabilities alongside established ones.”

“*Mindprints* is a topnotch national publication, and our 5th anniversary issue is the best yet,” added Fahey. Some 48 people have work published in Volume V. Contributions include “flash fiction” and “flash memoirs”—short stories of 250 to 750 words—by 24 writers. Other contributors include 22 poets, one featured poet, Barbara Crooker, and one featured local artist, Marti Fast.

“*Mindprints* reaches out beyond Hancock’s borders,” said Fahey. “The journal is becoming widely known throughout the states and abroad. It has attracted submissions from the Netherlands, Great Britain, India, Canada, Mexico, Russia, and Australia, as well as from the Central Coast and the Allan Hancock College campus.”

Spring sports wrap

The highlight of the 2005 spring season was the performance of sophomore track and field athlete Bobbie Patton, who won the Western State Conference, Southern California Regional and COA State championships in the shot put. The Righetti High School grad also placed second in the WSC discus and javelin throws, set a new school record in the javelin, and also earned All-WSC Academic honors.

In women’s tennis, Hancock’s two-year reign as the WSC team co-champion came to a close, but the Bulldog doubles team of sophomores Clair Lozano and Carlene Holst posted a sparkling 9-1 match record, won the WSC individual title, and advanced to the State Southern Regional. In baseball, sophomore second-baseman Jesse Murphy earned All-WSC first team honors with a .309 batting average and a strong fielding

performance.

In basketball, freshman Donte Williams, who averaged 23 points per game, was named to the all-conference team. The year also marked the beginning of a new era in Bulldog softball

under first-year head coach Angeli Guerrero.

In mid-May, it was announced that legendary men’s head basketball coach Bob White would return to his post permanently for the 2005-06 season following a one-year hiatus. White accepted reappointment to the position he had previously held for 21 years

following the departure of interim head coach Rich Hughes, who accepted the head coaching position at Bakersfield College. As the semester closed, AHC announced that no fewer than 31 spring-sport student athletes had met the criteria to receive All-Western State Conference academic honors.
